A month has passed on the new Labour government have already released a <u>Draft National Planning</u> <u>Policy Framework</u> (NPPF). This is out for consultation until September 2024. In the planning world, the obvious discussions are about the ambitious targets and use of 'Grey Belt' land for development opportunities. While this will inevitably have an impact in the world of arboriculture, possibly of more significance is Question 93, which asks: 'Are there any application types for which fees are not currently charged but which should require a fee?'

This specifically lists Tree Works applications (both those subject to a Tree Preservation Order and in a Conservation Area) in the associated text.

While the principal of charging for tree works applications seems like a good way of recouping fees for a Local Planning Authority, we remain sceptical that this will work in practice. If implemented, we would anticipate that this will lead to more breaches of unconsented tree works, as home owners will opt to forego the application. Local Planning Authority tree teams are already under resourced and facing mounting pressures, is this just another unnecessary load?

Furthermore, it is unclear how charging for such an application will remove the overburden on existing Tree Officers. This is something we will watch with interest following the consultation period.



# **New Draft National Planning Policy Framework** (NPPF)

The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government is seeking views on how the NPPF may be revised. As recently highlighted by Landmark Chambers, the consultation seeks views on the following:

- Re-casting the basis for the Standard Method, using housing stock instead of household predictions
- Changing paragraph 11d both in terms of triggers for the tilted balance and its wording
- Introducing the concept of grey belt into green belt considerations
- Changing affordable housing and mix policy
- Refocusing design policy on good design rather than 'beauty'

Consultation is open until 24th September.

## Kew tree species at risk due to climate change

In 2022, Kew Gardens lost 400 trees during the summer drought, prompting further research into potential loss in coming decades. The study has found that more than half of the tree species are at risk of death because of climate breakdown. This has led Kew to write a succession plan to replace some of the trees most likely to die.

### Tree bark can remove methane

Methane is a potent greenhouse gas, 80 times more powerful that carbon dioxide over its 20 year lifespan. Researchers at University of Birmingham found that microbes within tree bark or in the wood itself remove methane as well as carbon dioxide. This means that trees are 10% more beneficial for the climate than previously thought.


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### A time to reflect
